



What is Assistive Technology and Why Should We Use It?



Assistive Technology refers to any item, piece of equipment, software program, or product system that is used to increase, maintain, or improve the functional capabilities of individuals with disabilities.



It is an umbrella term that covers a wide range of tools designed to remove barriers and enable participation in education, work, and daily life.

Examples

Physical Devices: Wheelchairs, hearing aids, braille note takers, adaptive keyboards.



Digital Tools: Screen readers, text-to-speech software, speech recognition programs.

Educational Aids: Scanning pens, Clicker software, symbol-based communication tools.

Telford's Vision for Assistive Technology

In Telford, the vision for Assistive Technology is rooted in a commitment to inclusive education, where every learner—regardless of ability—has equitable access to the curriculum and the opportunity to thrive.

Assistive Technology should be embedded as a core component of teaching and learning, enabling students with additional needs to participate fully, achieve their potential, and develop independence.

The Assistive Technology lending library will provide mainstream schools with access to licenses and to trial equipment before purchasing.

This initiative will help embed Assistive Technology into the universal offer, ensuring it becomes an integral part of inclusive practice across all educational settings.

Inclusive Access to Learning

AT will be used to remove barriers to learning for pupils with SEND, ensuring they can access the same curriculum as their peers.

Schools will be offered training to ensure their awareness and appropriate use of free accessibility tools, such as text-to-speech, speech-to-text and screen readers.

Schools will have access to programmes/equipment that will support literacy skills and enable pupils to access all curriculum areas.

Alternative input devices for pupils with significant needs will be readily available and integrated into classroom practice.

Personalised Approach



Technology will be tailored to individual needs, promoting student agency and self-advocacy.



Pupils will be supported to choose and use the tools that work best for them, fostering independence and confidence.



Training/support will be available to identify appropriate AT solutions and embed them into personalised learning plans.



03




Outcome Notification
